<u>6: 19</u> Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal: <u>20</u> But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal: <u>21</u> For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also. <u>22</u> The light of the body is the eye: if therefore thine eye be single, thy whole body shall be full of light. <u>23</u> But if thine eye be evil, thy whole body shall be full of darkness. If therefore the light that is in thee be darkness, how great *is* that darkness! <u>24</u> No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon.

- Calvin, "What is here said with a special reference to riches, may be properly extended to every other description of vice."
- Bonhoeffer, "Everything which hinders us from loving God above all things and acts as a barrier between ourselves and our obedience to Jesus is our treasure, and the place where our heart is."

<u>6: 25</u> Therefore I say unto you, Take no thought for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than meat, and the body than raiment? <u>26</u> Behold the fowls of the air: for they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feedeth them. Are ye not much better than they? <u>27</u>Which of you by taking thought can add one cubit unto his stature? <u>28</u> And why take ye thought for raiment? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they toil not, neither do they spin: <u>29</u> And yet I say unto you, That even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. <u>30</u> Wherefore, if God so clothe the grass of the field, which to day is, and to morrow is cast into the oven, *shall he* not much more *clothe* you, O ye of little faith? <u>31</u> Therefore take no thought, saying, What shall we eat? or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewithal shall we be clothed? <u>32</u> (For after all these things do the Gentiles seek:) for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things. <u>33</u>But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you. <u>34</u> Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day *is* the evil thereof.

- Wesley, "Let us not be so ungrateful to Him, nor so injurious to ourselves, as to harass and oppress our minds with that burden of anxiety, which He has so graciously taken off."
- Bonhoeffer, "Only God can take care, for it is He who rules the world. Since we cannot take care, since we are so completely powerless, we ought not to do it either. If we do, we are dethroning God and presuming to rule the world ourselves."
- Luther, "It is man's bounden duty to work and do things, and yet withal to know that it is Another who nurtureth him. It is not his own work but the bounteous blessing of God."
- Bonhoeffer, "Neither anxiety nor work can secure his daily bread, for bread is the gift of the Father."

<u>7: 1</u> Judge not, that ye be not judged. <u>2</u> For with what judgment ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again. <u>3</u> And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye? <u>4</u> Or how wilt thou say to thy brother, Let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and, behold, a beam *is* in thine own eye? <u>5</u> Thou hypocrite, first cast out the beam out of thine own eye; and then shalt thou see clearly to cast out the mote out of thy brother's eye. <u>6</u> Give not that which is holy unto the dogs, neither cast ye your pearls before swine, lest they trample them under their feet, and turn again and rend you. <u>7</u> Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you: <u>8</u> For every one that asketh receiveth; and he that seeketh findeth; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened. <u>9</u>Or what man is there of you, whom if his son ask bread, will he give him a stone? <u>10</u> Or if he ask a fish, will he give him a serpent? <u>11</u> If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father which is in heaven give good things to them that ask him? <u>12</u> Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them: for this is the law and the prophets.
