Understand and Study the Bible Session 6: Understand & Study Parables

Parables

- A figure of speech in which there is brief or extended <u>comparison</u>.
- Fictional stories using everyday situations, people, or objects to teach a spiritual truth or answer a question
- Have a specific point figure out what that is

How does this change our process of Reading Carefully in Context?

- 1. Pray for God to speak to you through the passage, for His help in understanding, for Him to guard you from careless reading.
- 2. Read the whole passage through from beginning to end.
- 3. Identify the complete parable, including any related text before or after.
- 4. Read the entire chapter(s) containing the parable, plus one chapter before and one after.
- 5. Identify the genre of the writing is it prose or poetry, narrative or epistle, etc.? *It's a parable!*
- 6. Re-read the parable slowly, going verse by verse and sentence by sentence.
- 7. Re-read it at least 1 or 2 more times (consider reading different translations).
- 8. Think about how the parable fits into its immediate biblical context, then move outward.
- 9. Think about the <u>characters</u> and the <u>comparison</u>.
- 10. Understand the 1st century setting in which Jesus spoke to the best of your ability.
- 11. Determine the speaker's main point if it's in the passage, highlight it or underline it. If it isn't, write it in your own words.
- 12. Understand how the parable applies TODAY.

Tips for Finding the Point of a Parable

- Did Jesus or the inspired author tell us what the parable meant?
- Otherwise, did Jesus or the author tell us the subject of, or reason for, the parable?
- Otherwise, is there a concluding summary that drives the point home?
- Otherwise, what comes at the end or is the last spoken dialog?
- Otherwise, does it reference other Scripture that helps reveal the point?
- Otherwise, who or what gets the most attention in the parable?
